

THIRTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: We return to Ordinary Time this Sunday, and with this new season we focus on what it means to be a person who is called by God for some definite purpose. Elisha recognized God's call in Elijah's greeting and prepared immediately to follow. The people who came to Jesus seemed ready to follow, yet each had reasons to linger behind. As people who are given the freedom to follow or to stay behind, we must ask ourselves what we are ready to do for the sake of Christ and the call of the gospel. What are you called to do at this time in your life? Are you prepared to leave behind the things that get in the way of living as a Christian?


FOLLOW: What does it mean to follow Jesus? The Gospels show us that Jesus called each person individually, recognizing the things that stood in the way for each. He looked into the person's heart and saw the true desires of the person standing before him. Each of us experiences Christ's call uniquely as the persons we are. For some, following requires us to take stock of our lives and let go of the obstacles that keep us from the way of true discipleship. For others, the call may lead us to deepen the way that faith directs our lives, with more intentional time in prayer, regular participation in Mass, renewed attention to family, involvement in our parish, or new acts of service.

BE READY: It is easy to say we want to follow Jesus, yet most of us feel competing desires that stand in the way of discipleship. We may be distracted by the constant swirl of activity so prevalent in our surrounding culture; we might be lured by worldly wealth and the status that often accompanies it; we may simply be comfortable with the way things are and find it difficult to risk changing anything. In today's Gospel, Jesus makes it clear that we must stop putting off making the changes that will bring us closer to him and to God's way of life. We must trust in the Lord, knowing that what he most deeply desires is that we be close to him. If you encountered Jesus today and said you were ready to follow him, what would he see in your heart, what obstacles or hesitations would he perceive? Go to Jesus in prayer this day. Listen to him say, "Follow me." Prayerfully place your life in the Lord's hands and be ready to follow.

Please welcome Rev. Christopher Gibson, C.P., who will be joining us this weekend on behalf of Food for the Poor. Rev. Christopher Gibson, C.P. was born in 1948 in Argentina. He grew up partly there and in the USA. He studied under Pope Francis during his seminary years and was ordained to the priesthood in the Passionist Community, Buenos Aires in 1975. Since then he has ministered in Argentina, Uruguay, India, Tanzania and U.S.A., in parishes, schools, at retreat houses, as an itinerant missionary, and as superior/director of students in his order. He was instrumental in

recruiting and training young men to his order in India during its initial period of Foundation between 1982 and 1993. In 1996 he graduated with a Masters in Pastoral Studies at Catholic Theological Union, Chicago. Between 1996 and 2003 he gave parish missions and retreats in English and Spanish mostly in the USA, but also in Canada and Jamaica residing first in Chicago, then Houston and then Sacramento. Between 2004-2007 he served his Congregation as General Mission Secretary with residence in Rome, Italy. At present, he is back in the United States, ministering for Food for the Poor, as well as helping out in his diocese, the Diocese of Louisville, KY.
